Define a Smart Rural Community (SRC)?

- A community that is maximizing:
 - rural broadband networks/applications,
 - governmental agencies (local, state, federal)
 - Education (all levels)
 - Healthcare
 - Businesses to compete on a global scale regardless of size.
 - Infrastructure (Electric, water, housing, transportation, etc.)
 - Choices of where to live & how to get around
 - Community Disaster Recovery Plan/Public Safety
 - And more
- Collaboration with rural stakeholders to invest in the needs of the rural community.
- Attract and retain businesses and people (youth)



What makes a Smart Rural Community?

- High-capacity broadband networks only one tool
- Choices on where to live and how to get around
- Team of collaborative leaders
 - Manufacturers, application developers, telecom providers
 - Users who utilize the suite of broadband services and other smart energy efficient technologies
 - Rural focused National and State Associations
 - Federal and State Agencies
- Continuous development and evolution
- Incorporating applications across various platforms




What makes a Smart Rural Community?

- Examples of uses and platforms:
 - Customized learning environments that appeal to the student
 - Healthcare infrastructure Health Information Technology (HIT)
 - Electronic scheduling, remote patient monitoring
 - Mobile connectivity for farmers enabling precision farming
 - Connecting stakeholders with government resources, online government transactions
 - LTE wireless network and multimedia applications to enhance Public Safety Networks
 - Modern utility networks for energy, transportation, and water/waste
 - Smart Home Network enabling energy efficient living
 - Community/Regional Strategic Plan
 - Amend/update codes, ordinances and development requirements

 - Local/Regional Economic Developer
 - Federal & State Government agencies
 - Local Chamber of Commerce
- Strategic plan participation/development
- Follow the money



Build on the Character and Preserve

- When you've seen one rural community.... you've seen one rural community!
- Economic development strategies that use community's best assets.
- Youth/Entrepreneur initiatives
- Protect valuable farm land
- Enhance the existing community
- Build new neighborhoods



Local Government Savings

- Compared to Status Quo, SRC growth:
 - Cost less to build and maintain
 - Provides services at a lower cost
 - Reduces tax burden by maximizing return on public investment
 - Preserves existing communities
 - Reduces household transportation costs
 - Reduces health costs





Example of an SRC: Dickey Rural Networks

- Has been in business in North Dakota since 1950,
 - Study area covers 5, 644 sq. miles
 - 9,671 access lines
- They are 100% fiber Connected
 - In 2012, 7,423 broadband connections
- Experiencing same challenges as other companies
 - Loss of Access lines
 - Loss of USF
 - Very rural area, 1.7 access lines per sq. mile
 - Wireless competition



Dickey Rural Networks



- Decided to create a roadmap to be a Smart Community
 - Build the network,
 - create a culture of innovation,
 - Continuous training programs,
 - Create image as "THE Technology Solution" provider
 - Build relationships
- Smart Community activity
 - Smart Grid, Smart Water, Smart Educational Systems, Smart Farms, Smart Medicine
- Constantly seeking new opportunities for collaboration and new revenue streams

Other Examples

- North West Minnesota Special Access
 - Consortium of rural telecomm providers that connect 126 schools and 43 libraries in the state allowing students to take advanced placement classes, foreign language and other specialty courses
- Smith County Memorial Hospital
 - Uses broadband to consult with specialists in larger hospitals
- Swanberg Farms in Lyford, Texas
 - Uses broadband to monitor commodity prices and weather
- Montana
 - Enables livestock owners to record branding information online, more than 60% of livestock owners take advantage.



NTCA- SRC Initiative

- NTCA held meetings with key national associations and government agencies to listen, share, and create common long and short term initiatives and goals.

Thinking long term,

- As a result NTCA has developed the Smart Rural Communities Initiative and has highlighted 3 main areas of focus.
 - Healthcare
 - Public Safety
 - Education
- Provide a road-map and resources to rural communities



Advanced Medical Care

- The focus will be on leveraging Rural Development programs particularly Community Facilities REDLEG and Business programs.
 - Expand access to affordable healthcare to rural Critical Access Hospitals and clinics through telemedicine and health IT services.
 - Implementation of the Affordable Care Act will be the main driving force.

Public Safety and Critical Infrastructure

- Educate first Responders, state agencies, and rural infrastructure leaders on how Rural Development can support emergency communications and promote public safety goals.
 - State and County officials are currently developing strategic plans in accordance with First Net (federal nationwide public safety broadband network)
 - Rural stakeholders (telecom, electric, water) must be involved
 - Potential new revenue stream
 - Potential new expense with no revenue





Education

- Supporting the growth of youth and the mentoring of these next generation rural stakeholders.
 - Work with organizations such as local school districts, colleges and universities, nonprofits, and youth leadership organizations to promote youth retention.
 - Scholarship programs
 - Internship programs
 - Business Incubation
 - City Council
 - Community Boards and committees
- Make Smart schools an initiative priority





Why apply for the NTCA- SRC Initiative?

- NTCA-SRC awardees will be featured by NTCA in publicity and allowed to use the SRC service mark
- Will enhance public recognition of the community and help build your community
- Recognition can be used by the local broadband provider to encourage economic investment and interest in the community



How to be part of the NTCA-SRC Initiative

- Nomination classification
 - Showcase SRC- Pick what you are good at
 - Showcase community serves a PARTICULAR industry (ex: Education)
 - Showcase Communities are selected
 - Paradigm SRC
 - Paradigm community includes innovations serving MULTIPLE interests (ex: Healthcare, public safety, education, business)
 - Paradigm Communities are self-nominated
- No fee to apply if you are a member of NTCA
- Nominations are considered by a diverse group of telecom professionals, engineers, manufacturers, developers, and broadband providers.


USDA SRC Support
